

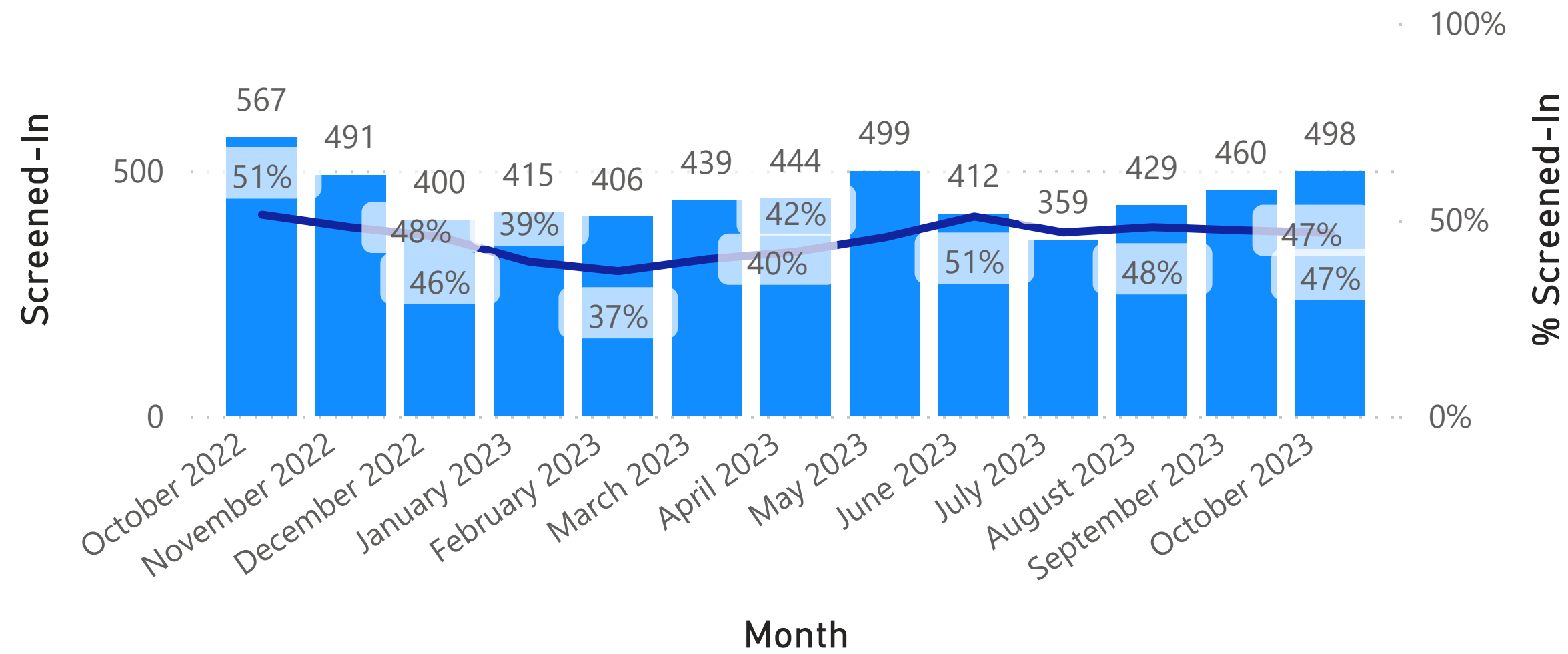

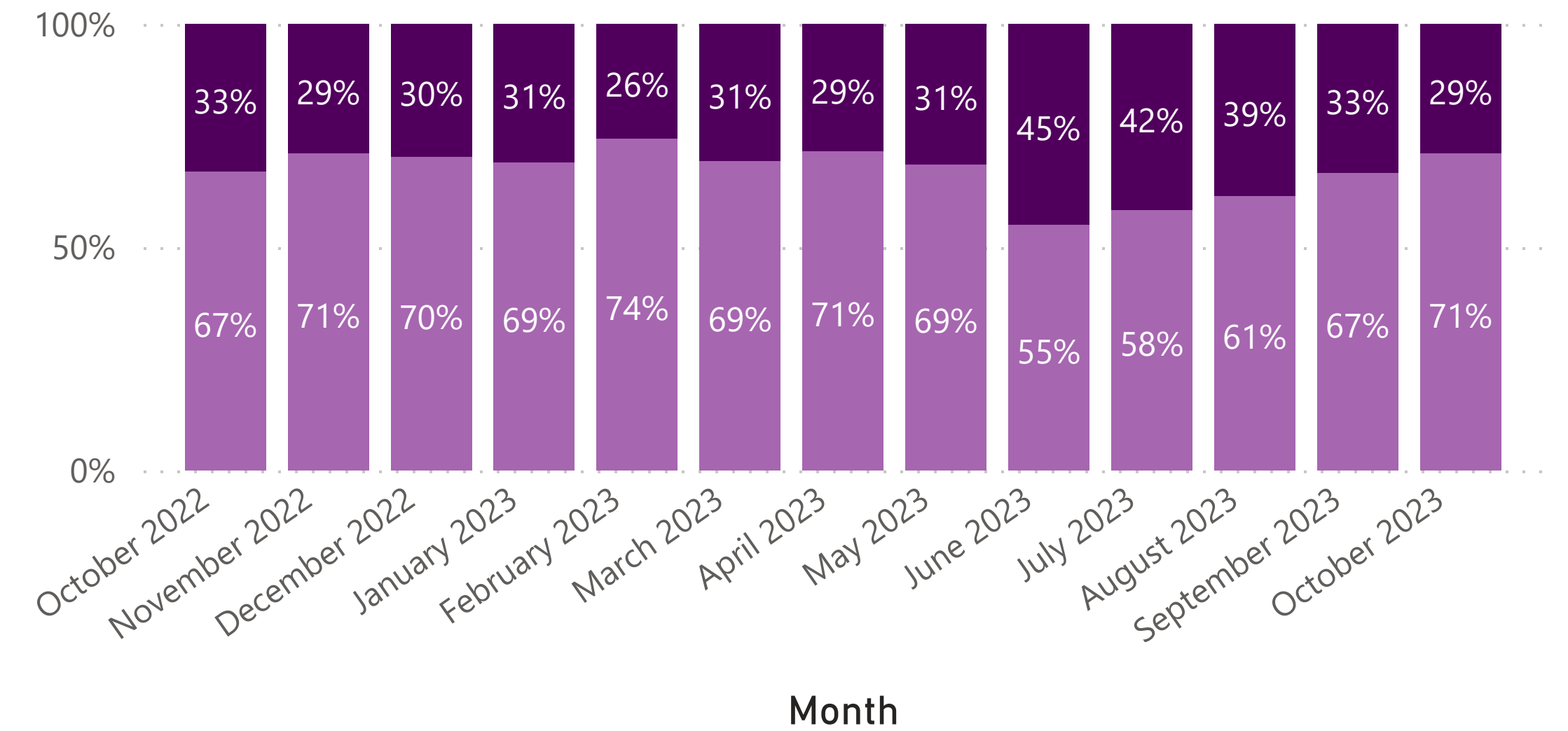
## Screened-In Intakes per Month

● Screened In ● Screen-In Rate

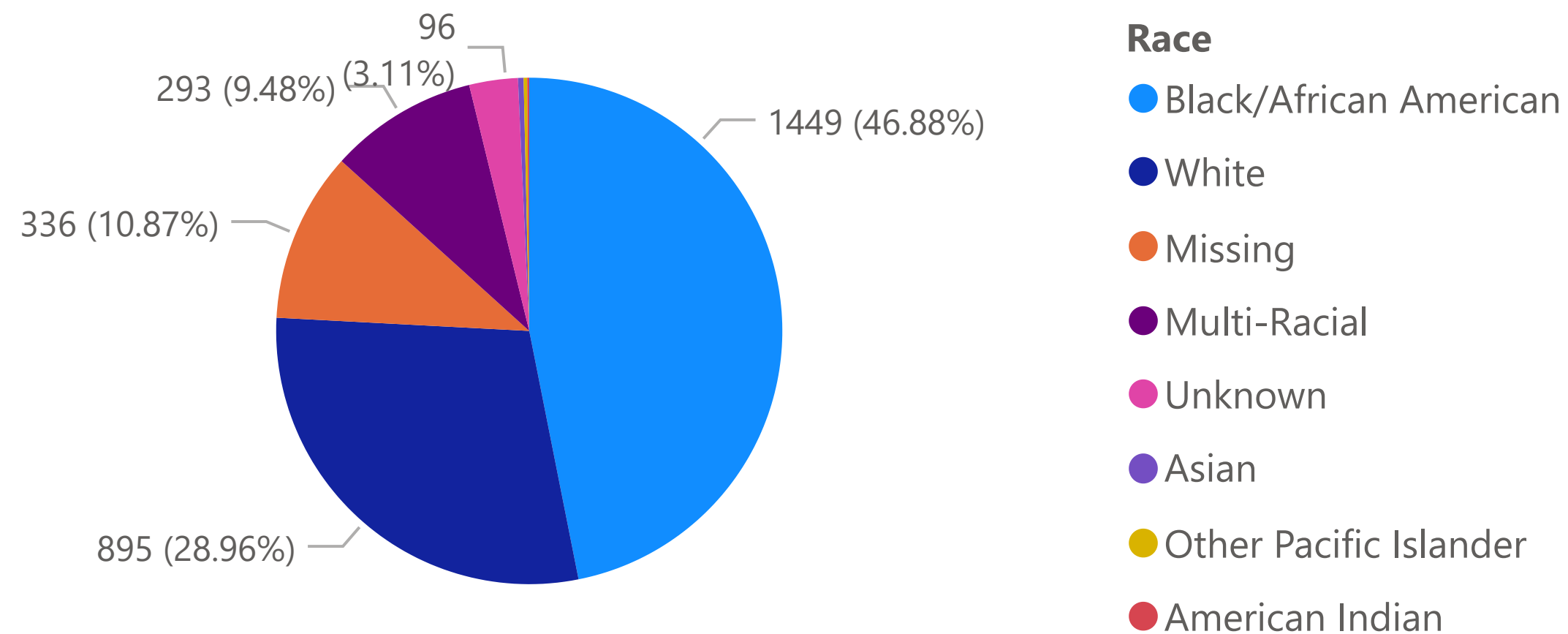


## Reporter Type for Screened-In Intakes

## Children with Screened-In Intake by Race: 2023



- In 2022 there were 5,828 Screened-In Intakes
- The majority of Screened-In reports made to 241-Kids are made by Mandated Reporters.
- Mandated Reporters include: Social Workers, Health Care Providers, Law Enforcement, School Personnel, etc.

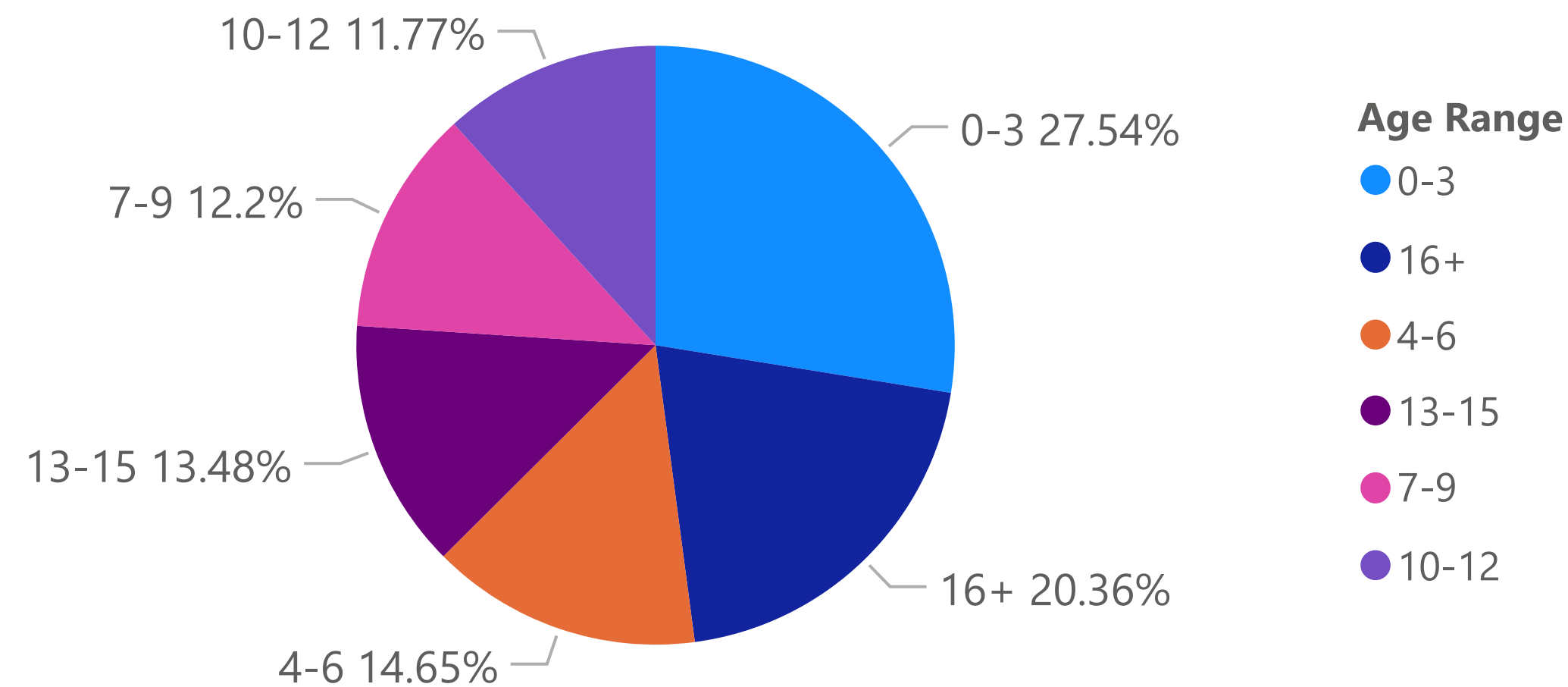
Note: An **Intake** is a report of alleged child abuse, neglect, dependency or family in need of services that is received by 241-Kids. Each Intake is either Screened-In and results in an open Children's Services case or is Screened-Out if it does not meet the criteria for further action by HCJFS. Each Intake can have multiple associated Calls made by more than one Reporter.

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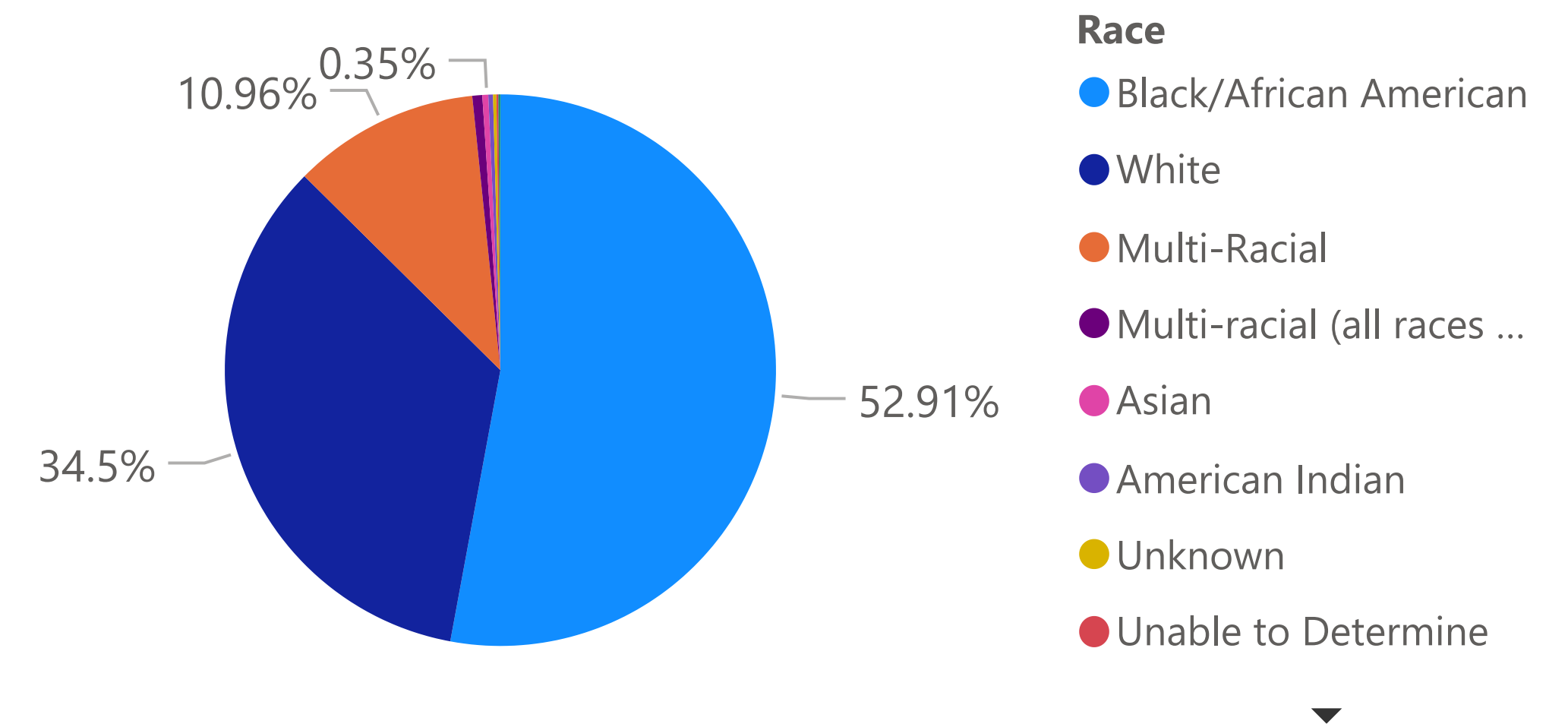
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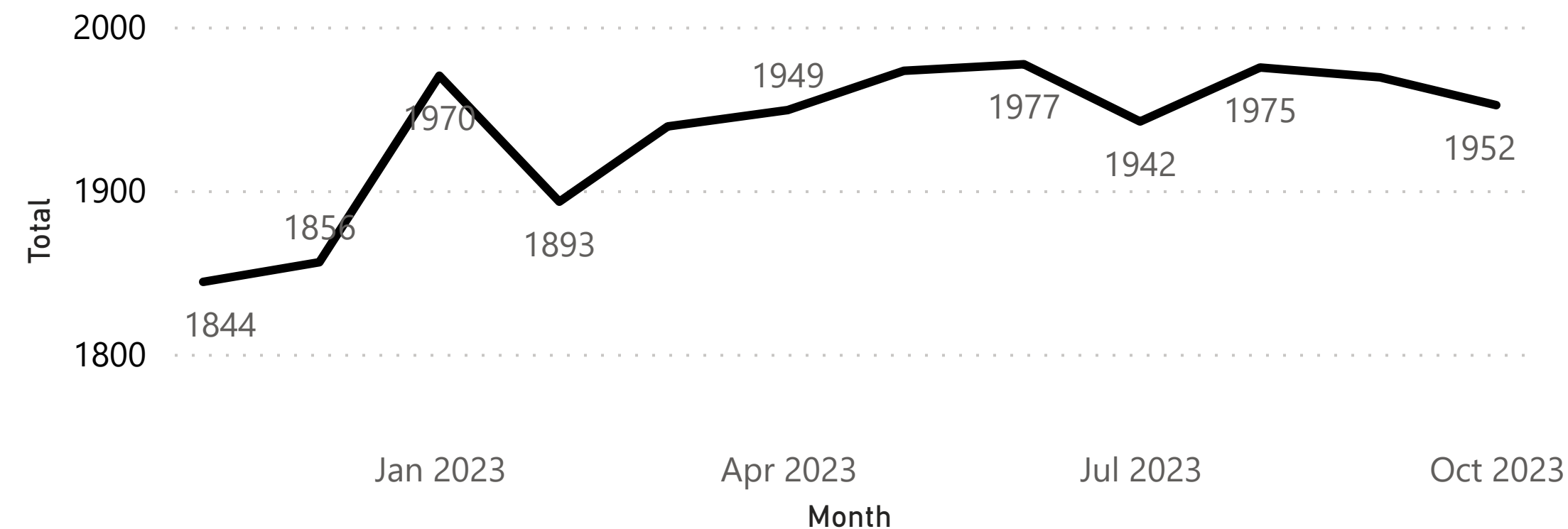
### Youth in Custody by Age (2023 To-Date)

### Total Custody by Month



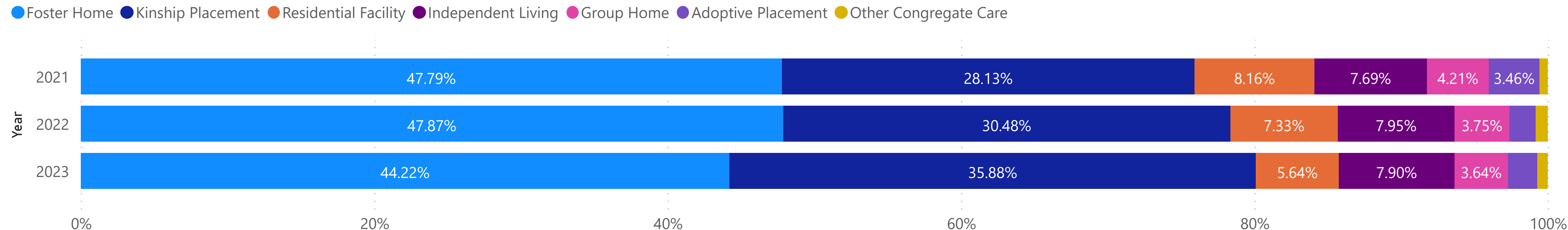
- In total, just over 2,600 youth were in HCJFS custody in 2022. This includes 886 youth who entered custody during the year.
- In 2022, 552 children were in Permanent Custody at some point during the year. 120 children were emancipated from HCJFS custody.
- 53% of all youth in HCJFS custody are Black/African-American, 35% are White, and 11% are Multi-Racial.
- 28% of children in custody are age 3 or younger; 22% are 16 or older.

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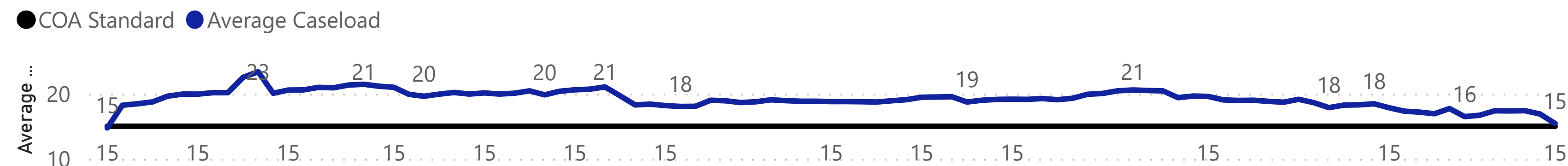
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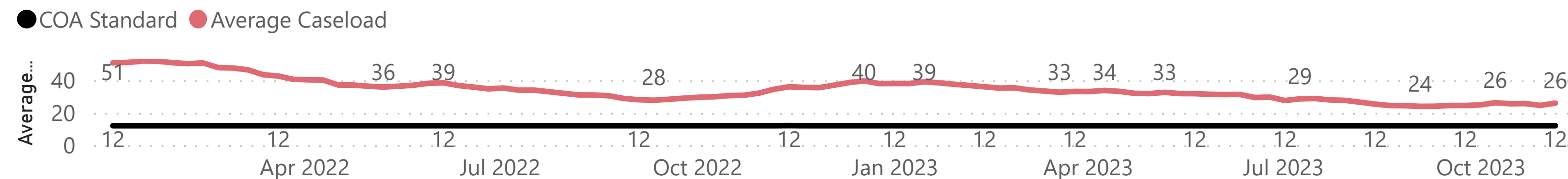
## Placements for Youth in Custody

## Average Caseload Size: Assessment



- Nearly 80% of youth currently in care are placed with Kin or in a Foster Home, an increase over prior years.
- Independent Living currently accounts for 8% of all placements; Adoptive Placements account for 4%.
- The remaining share of placement days (about 10%) are distributed across Congregate Care settings. Congregate care placements have decreased since 2021.
- Ongoing Caseloads remain at or just above the Council on Accreditation (COA) standard of 15 cases. Assessment Caseloads remain significantly higher than the national standard (12 cases).
